It was in 1993, that the American Stock Exchange launched the Spiders, SPDR to track the S&P 500. It was the first exchange traded product on markets with more coming later on. Diamonds was

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launched in 1998 which tracked the Dow Jones industrial average and Cubes in 1999, which tracked the NASDAQ 100. But it was the mutual funds that were the most popular with institutional and private investors both for quite some time.
